CCTV cams to check illegal waste dumping

Municipal Corporation of Gurugram (MCG) commissioner Mr. Ahuja has directed the sanitation wing to install CCTV cameras at 20 locations in a bid to check illegal dumping of waste across the city. MCG officials said that the sites will be regularly monitored and strict action will be taken on the violators.

The directions came in a meeting held by Ahuja on Friday to take solid waste management in the city. MCG has designated 34 secondary waste collection points, where garbage from residential societies and condominiums is gathered to be later managed by the waste management concessionaire, an official from the corporation said. "of these 34 points, MCG has ordered the closure of 20 points as these are to be upgraded by the concessionaire for better usability. There is a restriction on dumping waste at these points," he said.

Despite the ban, some people have been dumping waste at these points illegally, he added. "The feed from the CCTV cameras will be monitored 24x7 by special teams to identify the offenders and strict action will be taken against them', another official said. In the meeting, Ahuja also directed officials to clear the sites of waste and install planters and concrete seats so as to discourage people from dumping garbage. The MCG chief also told them to construct boundary walls around the remaining 14 sites and take strict actions against violators, the officials said.
